

Sonny Franzese, the Colombo crime family underboss who ran rackets throughout Long Island, is the subject of a new biography, *Sonny: The Last of the Old-Time Mafia Bosses*, John "Sonny" Franzese, by Newsday investigative reporter Sandra Peddie. Franzese saw Long Island as virgin territory and opened it up to organized crime. At home in Roslyn, he kept a low profile; but at night, he was the star of New York's club scene. Based on interviews with Sonny himself, 130 other people, and extensive document research, this is a rare look inside the Mafia. The Franzese family spent a fair amount of time in Huntington, including the Rare Olive Lounge on Jericho Turnpike. 


### Films Based on the Writings of Stephen King (In-Person & Zoom)






### Next Chapter Book Club (Zoom)

There will be a full body warm up followed by standing exercises designed to ease the body into movement, and simple QiGong walks. We will learn the 18 Lohan Hands through instruction and repetition and end with mindfulness meditation techniques created to clear the mind and improve concentration.

## Frequently Asked Questions

### Where do I find objects to print?

If you want to use objects that have already been designed, you can go to [www.thingiverse.com](http://www.thingiverse.com) and search using keywords. Once you've found what you want, download the files and send them to us at [hpl3dp@gmail.com](mailto:hpl3dp@gmail.com).

### Can I design my own objects?

Yes! We encourage you to go to [www.tinkercad.com](http://www.tinkercad.com) and learn how to design your own parts. There are lessons right there on the website. You can set up a free account in just a few minutes. Once you've designed your part, you can export the file and email it to us.

### How much does it cost to print an item?

The only thing you pay for is the PLA filament you use. We charge **\$1.00** per hour of print time. A typical print can take 4 or 5 hours.

### How large can my print be?

Our printer can produce objects up to 11 x 11 x 15 inches. However, your print time must be less than 12 hours so that we can accomplish the print during normal library business hours. Therefore, certain objects will not fall into the range of acceptability.

### Is there anything we will not print?

We will not print objects that are prohibited by law (i.e. weapons).






